## 2 CID member news

### (a) Rotary project funded

Rotary New Zealand World Community Service, on behalf of the New Lynn Club, has received a grant of \$160,000 from KOHAPICD for a project aimed at infrastructure development to increase the capacity of Swaziland's Manzini Community through partners Manzini Youth Care. There are estimated to be 156,000 orphans and vulnerable children (OVC's) in Swaziland, almost one in every four children under 18. They have no means of supporting themselves.

Additionally there are large number of vulnerable children who live with family members suffering from HIV. This project focuses on services and skills training for young people to enable them to become self-sufficient adults. Included in the project's objectives are developing farmland for an orphanage to increase profits from their farm thereby securing funds for health, housing and education in addition to skills training in beekeeping for 250 OVC's and the enabling of sustainable markets for the farm's produce.

Prior to the project being accepted, an onsite appraisal was done which confirmed a proven history of capacity building and empowerment of the local communities through a broad range of occupational trade training and business development skills.

**(l) Anzac Day theatrical commemoration of those who didn't fight**

This Anzac Day afternoon will be the first public performance of Michael Galvin's play *War Hero* at Downstage Theatre, Wellington, a play inspired by *We Will Not Cease* by Archibald Baxter and commissioned as part of the Bruce Mason Playwriting award.

The play reading, directed by Murray Lynch, will be accompanied by projection of celebrated paintings by Bob Kerr, which also tell Baxter's story, as featured in *Field Punishment No.1* by David Grant, a history of conscientious objection in New Zealand. The actors include Jed Brophy, Simon Ferry and Aaron Alexander.

Archibald Baxter was one of 14 conscientious objectors who were forcibly transported to the front line in France during the First World War where they were subjected to a variety of disciplinary measures, including the barbaric 'No. 1 field punishment'.

This play reading is being presented by Playmarket with Downstage, the Bruce Mason Estate, the Downstage Theatre Society, and the FAME Trust. It's also an opportunity to hear the work of a leading emerging playwright interpreting a classic of New Zealand literature with a stellar professional cast. The play was commissioned from Galvin as part of winning the Bruce Mason Playwriting Award, New Zealand's most significant theatre award.

Why did people keep this from me? I grumble a lot, especially about Microsoft products, but the idea of putting my complaints together as a choral piece never occurred to me. Complaints Choirs seem like a good way of getting moaning across to people that otherwise refuse to listen.

Complaints Choirs seem to be spreading like wildfire – some are good, some are rubbish. I recommend the [Helsinki](#) and [Hamburg](#) ones though the [Pokkilaakso Elementary School](#) has its points, if only for starting grumbling early in life.

The projects were initiated by Finnish artists Tellervo Kalleinen and Oliver Kochta-Kalleinen. Starting in Birmingham in 2005. Since then there's been complaints choirs in the States, Singapore, Melbourne, Sweden and many more.

The Finns excel at this sort of thing, though I wish they'd stop producing the mobile phones that are tearing apart our social fabric.

For more choral critique, Aki Kaurismaki's movie [Total Balalaika Ensemble](#) finished off any remaining honour of the Soviet Union by teaming the Red Army Choir with the joke rock band The Leningrad Cowboys for a live gig. According to the [Kaurismaki website](#): "its virtues are more of a documentary of a one-of-a-time event, and as such, it fills its purpose" and they gave it two stars. This seems to be a website devoted to the films of the Kaurismaki brothers run by people who don't like their movies much.
