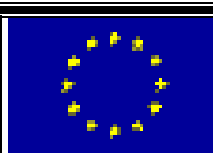

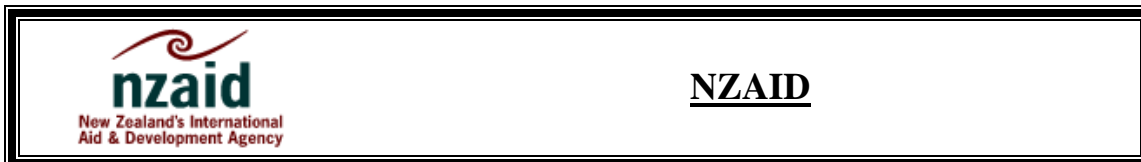

<p>Freedom from Violence</p>	<p>IWDA promotes the right of women to be free from violence. This is achieved by supporting the work of project partners in programs to eliminate violence against women and girls to provide support services to women in situations of violence.</p> <p>IWDA has been supporting development activities addressing violence against women in our overseas program since 1989, at a time when it was not recognised as a development issue by many agencies, governments or the UN system. 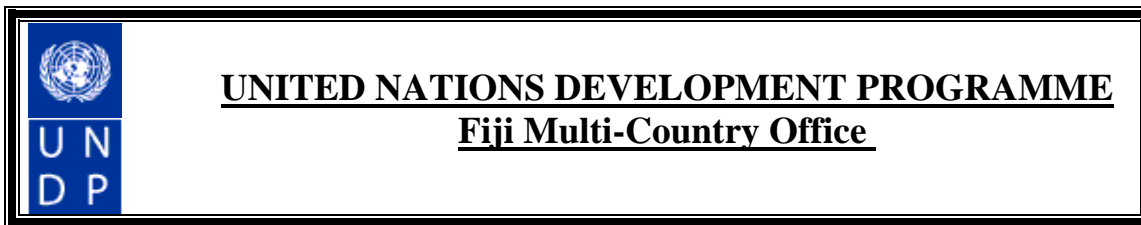

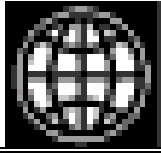
